

## Kushava shines in Redbirds' shutout

■ Allows just three hits and belts two home runs in 9-0 victory

PESHIGO — The Marinette Redbirds rode Brian Kushava's arm and bat to a convincing 9-0 Wishigan League baseball triumph over Peshtigo Saturday.

Kushava allowed just three hits in seven innings. At the plate, he went 3 for 4 with two home runs and five RBIs.

"A great day for an excellent ballplayer," Marinette coach John LaCourt said.

Marinette improved to 6-1 in the Wishigan, 1 1/2 games ahead of Escanaba.

Steve Campbell doubled and scored on Jake Gasser's base hit to put the Redbirds up 1-0 in the first inning.

Ryan Johnson's RBI single helped the Redbirds score twice in the fourth.

Kushava's two-run home run opened up a 6-0 lead in the seventh, and he followed it with a three-run blast in the ninth.

Campbell also had three of Marinette's 14 hits.

Jeff Baumann took the loss on the mound for the Timbers. He struck out nine, walked two and allowed seven earned runs.

"We usually have a hard time with Jeff Baumann, but this time we hit him hard," LaCourt said.

Baumann's leadoff double in the third represented Peshtigo's biggest scoring threat. He took third on Jimmy LeMay's sacrifice, but Kushava worked out of the jam with two come-backers.

Johnson finished up with two hitless innings in which he fanned two and walked two.

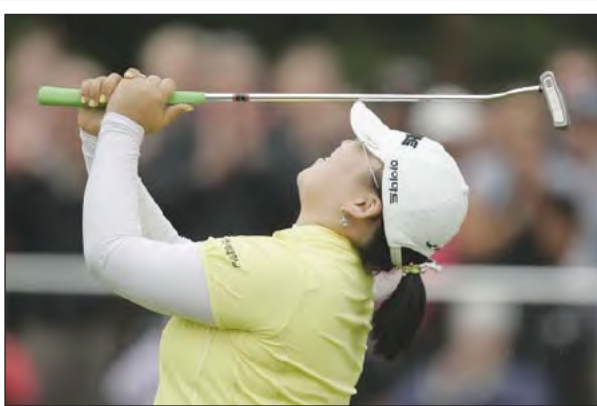
The Redbirds improved to 9-4 overall.

## Braves put Brewer brooms in closet

ATLANTA (AP) — Jorge Campillo felt right at home in the Georgia heat.

Campillo struck out six in seven innings and the Atlanta Braves beat Ben Sheets and the Milwaukee Brewers 5-0 on Sunday to avoid a series sweep.

Campillo, a native of Tijuana, Mexico, and a veteran of eight seasons in the Mexican League, cut short his pregame routine with temperatures in the 90s at Turner Field and improved to 3-0 in his last five starts.

"I try not to throw a lot of pitches in the bullpen," Campillo said of hot days. "Save it for the game."

Campillo (6-4) struck out six, walked none and lowered his ERA to 2.58. He is 4-0 with a 2.02 ERA in 13 appearances in day games, including seven starts.

"He has one of the best changeups I've ever seen," Brewers manager Ned Yost. "He throws an 86 fastball that looks like a 95."

Jeff Bennett and Will Ohman pitched the eighth, and Mike Gonzalez got three outs to complete the seven-hitter.

The loss snapped the Brewers' nine-game road winning streak, which tied for the longest in franchise history. Milwaukee fell five games behind the NL Central-leading Cubs.

Sheets (10-5) surrendered two earned runs and six hits in six innings, falling to 1-4 in seven starts since a dominant 4-1 complete-game victory in Atlanta on June 24.

"I feel like I've been kind of struggling lately," Sheets said, adding he can't explain the slump.

Campillo and fellow rookie Jair Jurrjens have been key performers in a rotation missing Tim Hudson and John Smoltz due to season-ending injuries. Hudson confirmed Saturday he will have season-ending elbow surgery; Smoltz already has had shoulder surgery.

"I came here for an opportunity and I want to stay here in the starting rotation," Campillo said. "I don't care if it's No. 1 or No. 2 or No. 5."

Campillo stranded runners on second and third in the seventh by striking out Jason Kendall and pinch-hitter Rickie Weeks. The right-hander helped create the jam with a throwing error after fielding a bunt by Gabe Kapler.

"Campillo, again, pitched an unbelievable ballgame," Braves manager Bobby Cox said. "He clutched it up in that one inning when they had runners on second and third and one out. ... To get out of that jam and not give up one run is really something."

Mark Kotsay and Omar Infante had run-scoring doubles in the Braves' two-run first inning. Sheets threw 36 pitches in the inning.

"This may sound stupid, but I thought that was one of Ben's better outings for a while," Yost said. "

LONG POND, Pa. (AP) — Carl Edwards won Sunday's NASCAR Sprint Cup race at Pocono Raceway, gambling with a pit strategy that he thought would cost him the victory.

Edwards pitted from the lead just before a rain shower that caused a 41-minute red flag and had the driver arguing with crew chief Bob Osborne over the decision. But the plan worked perfectly as the race wound up going to completion. Edwards stretched his last tank of fuel to earn his fourth victory of the season.

"I was really nervous that we made the wrong call there," Edwards said after doing his traditional victory backflip off his car. "Bob's the smartest guy in the world. We were really arguing. We made light of it, but we thought we made the wrong call."

The race started in sunshine and it appeared Mark Martin, who took the lead from pole-winner Jimmie Johnson at the start and took control would be the driver to beat all day. But

Martin had problems on two pit stops that put him back into the pack and then dark clouds began moving in, changing some strategies.

Rain began falling on lap 127 of the 200-lap event and, moments later, Edwards and several other leaders ducked onto pit road. Nineteen other drivers, led by June Pocono winner Kasey Kahne and Martin, who led a race-high 55 laps, stayed out to gain track position, waiting to see if the rain might end the race prematurely.

But, despite more threatening clouds and a few raindrops later in the event, the racing continued and Edwards found himself back on top for good when Martin, the last of the drivers on the alternate strategy, had to finally pit on lap 187.

Then Edwards, who made his final stop at the end of lap 166, just had to worry if he had enough gas to get to the end.

Edwards inherited a 5.6-second lead and built it to more than 7 sec-

onds as Osborne kept telling his driver on the radio to take it easy and save fuel. He did ease up over the last few laps and made it easily, beating Tony Stewart by almost 4 seconds — half the front straightaway on the 2.5-mile trioval.

Stewart and third-place finisher Jimmie Johnson, coming off a victory last week in Indianapolis, were both on the same strategy as Edwards. Johnson was one of several drivers who coasted across the finish line, out of gas.

Kevin Harvick, who crashed with Joe Nemechek on the first lap, came back to finish fourth, just ahead of David Ragan.

Kahne wound up seventh and Martin eighth.

The victory vaulted Edwards from fifth to third in the season standings, trailing only Dale Earnhardt Jr. and Kyle Busch
